It then takes the viewer through the incredible process of loss, healing and embracing life once again. Produced and directed by Judith Burdick, the film drew from her own personal loss and tragedy, when in 1991, at only 31 years of age, Burdick with two small children, lost her husband, Mark Rubens, who was killed in a scuba diving accident.
